
STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS BY THE NUMBERS:

A large function of the Office of Student Activities is to support, advise, and mentor our student organizations. Student organizations have gradually increased over the years. Pre-COVID, we had 57 organizations which declined every year from 2016-2019.

After returning to campus for the Fall 2021 semester we have increased our organizations from 43 during 2020-2021 to 46 during 2021-2022. This past academic year we had an increase of 28% in our organizations bringing our number to 59. The number of student organizations have remained the same from 2022-2023 to 2023-2024. We transitioned Club Sports (7 in total) to Campus Recreation. This allows these student organizations more support. If we kept them, our number would have been 66 active student organizations.

Below is a chart of active number of student organizations during the past 8 academic years.

This number does not include Fraternities/Sororities.





We have completed two rounds of new student organization applications. We accept applications from April 1st to May 1st for the fall semester and November 1st to December 1st for the spring semester. For the academic year we had 20 new organizations. The approval and on-boarding of new organizations is supported by our Assistant Director of Student Activities.

For Fall 2024, we had 9 applications submitted which are currently under review.

STUDENT ORGANIZATION RECOGNITION:

In order to be recognized (active status), a student organization must maintain a roster of 10 Farmingdale State College students and an executive board that minimally consists of a president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer. We highly encourage additional officers and/or co-positions to increase students in leadership positions and aid in transitions of leadership. All paperwork related to this process is found and submitted via RamCentral, an online network

Members of the executive board must re-register their organization with the Office of Student Activities via RamCentral every semester. This is what communicates that the organization intends on having an active status for the upcoming semester. This process takes approximately 5 minutes



to complete. In this step, the organization's president or primary contact will indicate who the executive board officers are going to be, declare a Primary Advisor, and upload the organization's constitution. Once this step is complete, the OSA staff will review each student officer for eligibility. We require that all officers be in "good standing" with the college. Any officer who is ineligible is informed directly by the OSA staff. Any organization registration will not be approved until all officers are eligible to hold the position. Organization leaders have until the advertised deadline to complete this process. To maintain an "active status", all officers must complete the required training sessions and the organization must hold at least one general membership meeting per month.

Executive Board members must complete three training items for their organization to be considered "active".

• <u>RamCentral E/Board Training:</u>

- This training is conducted in a "learn at your own pace" module that outlines required items and expectations for Executive Board members. It also covers the basics of using RamCentral as an 'administrator'; officers are given administrative access in their portal once their training is complete.
- 317 RamCentral/E-Board trainings were submitted during the 2023-2024 Academic Year; 185 Fall 2023; 132 Spring 2024

• <u>Sexual Assault Prevention Training (per SUNY mandate):</u>

- In partnership with Kathleen Flynn, Title IX coordinator, every member of a student organization Executive Board is required to attend a session.
- 171 organization officers attended a session during the 2023-2024 Academic Year;
 113 Fall 2023; 58 Spring 2024
- 13 sessions were held during the 2023-2024 Academic Year: 7 Fall 2023; 6 Spring 2024

• <u>Student Government Financial Tutorial:</u>

- During the 2021-2022, the SGA Accountant created and implemented a financial tutorial that is required by all SGA funded organizations to complete. We require that the Presidents and Treasurers complete this training to ensure they are aware of all policies regarding SGA allocated funds
- 447 financial tutorials were completed. This number is higher than the other two trainings because they are required to complete it every semester. The other two trainings are only required once during their time as an Executive Board Member.

Since last year's "Lunch and Learn" officer transition session was so successful, we held another session at the end of the Fall 2024 semester on May 7, 2024. 49 new and returning officers attended. This allowed incoming officers to begin completing their required training sessions as well as provided an opportunity to connect with their Program Advisor in the OSA. Our intention



with this session was to allow students an opportunity to get their questions answered and begin the process of re-registration early to reduce unnecessary stress once the fall semester starts. The session was overwhelmingly successful and our student officers appreciated the proactive information.

Each student organization is assigned one of the OSA staff members to serve as a "Program Advisor". A "Program Advisor" is there to guide organizations in the event planning process. This staff member will be the main point of contact between the organization and the OSA.


STUDENT ORGANIZATION EVENTS:

Below is a chart outlining the student organizations and the total number of meetings, advertising tables, and events.

Meetings: 676 total meetings were scheduled this past academic year (305 Fall 2023, 371 Spring 2024). The reduction in this number from last year can be contributed to several factors: a change in the way the 'meeting' category has been used, the transition of club sports groups to Campus Recreation (and therefore no reservations are coming through the OSA for these groups), and the significant decrease of useable space for all student organization gatherings. Post COVID, we have also had a number of student organizations incorporate virtual meetings and virtual guest speaker events into their event offerings.

Interesting Note: pre-COVID we had an overwhelming demand for Campus Center Tables. During the Fall 2021 semester, custodial added 2 additional tables. They have been vastly underutilized





OFFICE OF STUDENT ACTIVITIES EVENTS:

With the addition of 4 professional staff members since the end of the 2023-2024 academic year, the Office of Student Activities has been able to once again make significant increases in our programming offered to the student body at large. Our events range from DEI focused celebrations, to food trucks, to DIY nights, off campus trips, and other social events. This year we were able to offer 94 unique programs. We offered 54 during the Fall 2023 Semester and another 40 during the Spring 2024 semester.

The success of our events on campus are largely due to our Student Programming Assistants (SPA). The SPA position was introduced during the Fall 2021 semester. Currently we employ 4 students for 10-18 hours a week to plan, develop, and execute the office's programming. Below is a chart including all our events for 2023-2024, broken down by each semester.

Some increase in event attendance can be contributed towards the increased focus on social media. Currently the OSA Instagram has nearly 3,600 followers, a 36% increase during the past academic year. This has been done through the implementation of a social media calendar, and having dedicated SPAs to focus on these improvements. Moving forward, the office plans to create a Facebook page to reach additional members of the Farmingdale community. Additionally, SPAs will continue to work closely with the professional staff to ensure proper promotion of department activities and club specific efforts.

Farewell to Farmingdale also made a return. Farewell to Farmingdale is an end of the year gala where students (of all class years) can come together and celebrate the close of another academic year. We hosted over 225 students at Jericho Terrace in Mineola for a night of dancing, food, and fun.

We closed out the 2024 academic year with our annual concert and carnival, RamChella! This year, we expanded on multiple aspects of the event, making it our most successful event yet. Changes include a complete rebranding of the event, expanded polling of the campus, and a bigger carnival, as well as incorporating an opening artist to the concert lineup. Additionally, we upgraded the stage, both in size and production quality, featuring RamChella's new logo on large banners on either side of the stage. These efforts resulted in a great turnout, with over 1,700 students in attendance, a 40% increase from 2023.

Looking forward, the OSA team plans to continue to expand their efforts of positive and meaningful engagement with the Farmingdale student community. As annual events continue to evolve and grow, there is a focus on ensuring diverse opportunities and experiences reflective of the diverse population on campus.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION:

The Student Government Association is in it's 12th year of existence on campus and has been a 503C, not for profit since 2019. The Student Government Association had a great year and was able to expand a lot of action items and goals.

Student Government Elections were held in early April and voter turnout increased 37% for the Spring 2024 elections. For the first time in recent years we had contested elections. Both Treasurer and Secretary had contested elections.

The SGA has also filled a record number of Senator spots. For the first time in SGA's history, they will start an academic year with a full senate. Senate consist of 9 senators at large and 2 senators from each of the four schools.

The SGA gifts the campus an annual "present" every year. This year the SGA will fund a number of Adirondack chairs out by the Campus Center. A long-term goal that was intended to be part of the campus gift was the addition of a "Club Hub" a shared collaborative workspace for student organizations. This will take some time due to space constraints on campus.

FSC SGA has been active within in SUNY Student Assembly (SA). Farmingdale Student Government was able to send 10 students to both the fall conference held in Syracuse, NY and the spring conference held in Glen Falls, NY. Both semesters, FSC had the largest delegation in attendance. President-elect Jairo Orozco unsuccessfully ran for SUNY SA Treasurer, where Senator Mazen Kapadi successfully was elected as the Ag/Tech representative.

The incoming SGA President and Vice President, who are both returning executive board members are working hand in hand over the summer to keep the momentum going.

SGA's budget has been increased in several areas including providing more financial access to Residence Life, DEI programming, increasing in large programming.

SGA is looking to streamline how student groups and departments collaborate, whether as a financial source or programmatic partner. SGA executive board will launch an official SGA Collaborative Form so departments and student organizations can officially request to work with SGA. This will create a fair and equitable approach.



STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION FINANCES:

The chart below shows the paperwork that has been processed via Student Government's Accountant Debra Ciancio. The Director of Student Activities and SGA Treasurer approve EAFs and REQs, but all other processing is handled solely by Debra.

Terminology:

EAF: Expense Authorization Form- each purchase must have a pre-approved EAF "attached" to it.

REQs: Requisition: Settlement of purchased. This is either done via a paper check or an online purchase using the PEX card. PEX are debit cards that are managed by the SGA Accountant.

• *Pex usuage has increased dramatically due to the easy nature of using a debit card opposed to waiting for a check.*

Financial Tutorial Submissions- Created on Ram Central as a means to present Financial Processing for Clubs and test knowledge.

REQ's paid with PEX Card, although convenient, creates significantly more work due to the following:

- Each PEX Req requires an Additional process and form to Request Funds that are put on to the individual Program Advisors Card
- Purchases/Postings on PEX Account need to be verified/confirmed
- Each PEX REQ can contain multiple purchases, multiple vendors and time delay postings
- PEX consist of 2 Accounts- Bank and Card Balance which needs to be reconciled monthlythis includes individual activity on 7 Cards.

REQ's paid by check are usually for one vendor unless it is a reimbursement or for SGA Stipends.

Additional Fund Request implemented as a means for clubs to access funds beyond their approved budget and fund new clubs.

FRATERNITY/SORORITY LIFE:

Fraternities and sororities have made tremendous contributions to campus life. With each new chapter, students get a new option to get involved in a student organization and participate in community service.


Fraternities


There currently are five fraternities –Tau Kappa Epsilon (TKE), Omega Psi Phi, Kappa Sigma, Alpha Sigma Phi, and Alpha Phi Delta (ADP).

Omega Psi Phi is still the only organization who is a part of National Pan-Hellenic Council on campus. This fact is significant because NPHC is a collaborative organization of nine historically African American, international Greek lettered fraternities and sororities. We are planning to host an NPHC Expo in the Fall with the goal of showing other NPHC Organizations that Farmingdale State College is interested in having more NPHC Organizations on campus.

We are currently also working to re-establish Phi Iota Alpha on campus. Phi Iota Alpha was our first organization on campus in 2011. They are a historically Latino Fraternity founded in 1931.











Sororities

There currently are three sororities- Sigma Delta Tau, Phi Sigma Sigma, and Delta Phi Epsilon on campus.







Farmingdale's Fraternity/Sorority Community is maintaining strong participation.

We are ending the Fall 23- Spring 24 academic year with 316 students involved. We are hoping to increase our student involvement in the Fall. With a strong Fall recruitment, we should be able to surpass 350 members.

For the first time since 2020 Greek Life leaders from our organizations attended the 2024 Northeast Greek Leadership Association Annual Conference in Hartford, CT.

NGLA offers an educational experience that provides our fraternal leaders with inspiration, hope, and vision to navigate the world. They brought back valuable skills and resources to help their chapters and the community. All members who attended had a positive experience so much so they have become ambassadors for the event, and new students have already asked if they can attend in 2025.

After a few semesters off students re-formed the Greek Council. Along with their planning and guidance they helped facilitate Greek Week. In a greater effort to be more present in the Farmingdale Community the Farmingdale Greek Council sponsored a Farmingdale little league softball team, even volunteering at their annual parade.

Each new member is required to attend a sexual assault prevention workshop hosted by the Title IX office. We offered 10 sessions and to date every new member has attended one.

In collaboration with the Title IX office, the Office of Student Activities brought in a sexual assault prevention speaker on April 16th. Bonny Shade came to campus to speak about her story and her survivorship. Over half of all Greek Life attended the event.

The Order of Omega, which is a Greek Life honor society, inducted 13 new members during the Spring 2024 semester.

Fraternity and Sorority Life is rooted in service work. Notable service projects over the 23-24 school year include: Alpha Phi Delta's Toys for Tots Fundraiser, SDT Fantasy Man, Alpha Sigma Phis's State Park Cleanup, Phi Sigma Sigmas Pie-a-Phi, Kappa Sigmas Cornhole Tournament, Tau Kappa Epsilons St. Judes TKE Bowl, and Delta Phi Epsilons 65 Roses Gala. For the 2023-2024 academic year Greek Life raised and reported over \$30,000 for various charities and community outreach with Delta Phi Epsilon being responsible for almost half of that total.

In a great showing of Fraternity/Sorority Life coming together to achieve a common goal, this past year during Greek Week all 7 organizations came together to collect cans and other food items for Long Island Cares. Long Island Cares provides the community with anywhere from 15-20,000 pounds of food each month. Together the groups collected over 70,000 items equaling to 46,000 pounds of food. Shattering the record for any one-day event held for LI Cares. They were featured in the Long Island Patch and will also be featured in the Long Island Cares Spring/Summer '24 Newsletter.



LOOKING AHEAD TO 2023-2024

The success of the Office of Student Activities despite some challenges has been overwhelming exciting this year.

The Spring 2024 semester in particular has been full of new and exciting collaborative approaches. We have been working with partners across campus both in and out of our division to move the needle forward. The Office of Student Activities is looking to capture this energy and move it forward.

The number of events, students involved, fraternity/sorority members, student organizations have maintained or increased.

The Office of Student Activities was able to onboard back to a full staff and each staff member have passion projects they have been working on.

We are redesigning how we offer trainings to our student organizations. For the past few years, everything has been virtual/form based. Amanda Cataldo has expanded the modalities for student organization trainings.

SGA President Orozco is looking to launch a leadership development program, called *Rams on the Rise* with help from Bryan Garcia, Dylan Gafarian, and the Office of Student Activities. Applications will go live in early August.

The biggest challenge OSA/student groups/Greek Life faces is space.

There have been challenges that are consistent throughout the years. There is always a struggle to secure large programming space. Space, especially large ones, is lacking on campus. The campus center ballroom is one of the most popular and nice space for events. One set up is permitted in the ballroom per day, limiting the number of groups that can use the space. The other struggle is that offices book the ballroom and then seem to cancel at the last minute or they could have been accommodated in a classroom space.

There are also costly custodial costs if student groups are looking to coordinate events during the weekends and late nights. This limits when students can plan events.

Looking forward to next year, the Office of Student Activities is hopeful in meeting goals of increasing Fraternity/Sorority Life to 350 members (up from 316), Hosting 110 events (up from 94), and increasing the recognized student clubs by 5% over 2023-2024. OSA will continue to reach across the aisle and partner with various offices both in and out of the division. Another long-term goal is to re-position the SGA to be a true student advocacy board on campus.
